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EDITORIAL (by Alan Borwell)

No.12 - December 1983

When this News Bulletin reaches readers, all 1983/4 competitions should be underway and details, along with last season's results, are shown in later pages. My visit to Poland was a fascinating experience and ICCF approved our Centenary International Tournament and the arrangements for the 1985 ICCF Congress at Peebles Hotel Hydro.

Our new Secretary, Alan Hind, has done an excellent job in taking over from Val Nye and his first Secretarial Notes follow this Editorial. Could readers please note that Chess Suppliers (Scotland) now have a new address but the same telephone numbers (see inside back cover).

SECRETARIAL NOTES (By Alan Hind)

A Secretary as defined by the Concise Oxford Dictionary is an 'official appointed to conduct correspondence, keep records and deal with business'. In a way, the notes here deal with all three points.

The SCCA's 1982/83 season has just concluded and it has been a highly successful one. Specifically, our congratulations go to Douglas Bryson for his fine performance in winning the British Championship, to Alan Tankel who won the British Junior Championship and to Mrs. Elaine Hartford who was runner-up in the British Ladies Championship. On a more nationalistic theme, our congratulations also go to Phil Giulian who won the Scottish Championship, thereby gaining a third norm which entitles him to the Scottish Master title (and still finding time to finish a creditable 4th in the British Championship).

On the International front, our teams are now well into their games in the Olympiad and European team championships (see later reports) and we wish our representatives well as these competitions progress. Administratively, too, Scotland has achieved further recognition with the election of Alan Borwell as Treasurer of the ICCF at its Congress in Poland (again reported later).

To deal with the keeping of records and the general business, I would like to mention a few important general guidelines which, if followed, will make life a lot simpler for future domestic seasons:

1. If you change address, please notify me as soon as possible so your News Bulletins etc can be redirected.
2. Similarly, if you change address, go on holiday or have a period of illness, contact your opponents and your controller as soon as possible. By doing this, you ensure you don't get defaulted!
3. There is little time between the end of one season and the beginning of the next. In a short period, all results have to be collated, graded and competitors' eligibility for the next season's competitions assessed. To ensure this is done most efficiently, results and adjudication claims must be submitted quickly.

The final point for this issue concerns the lottery. As the date for the drawing of the prize is rapidly approaching, can I urge all members to support the Association by a final concentrated selling effort.

In conclusion, I would like to wish you all a pleasurable and successful 1983/84 season.

SCOTTISH CENTENARY INTERNATIONAL CORRESPONDENCE CHESS TOURNAMENT
(progress report by Alan Borwell)

Arrangements for our first international invitation event are progressing very well and we hope to be able to start play on schedule on 2nd February 1984, which will be the 100th anniversary date of the founding of the Scottish Chess Association in 1884.

SCOTTISH CORRESPONDENCE LEAGUE

After a very close contest, Perth Correspondents regained the Scottish Correspondence League Championship by the narrowest winning margin. The final outcome depended on the adjudication of the two games between Ken Mitchell of Perth and Douglas Livie of Chess Suppliers (Scotland). These resulted in a win each for the respective teams and it is to the player's credit that the decisions were accepted, without appeal. In joint third place, both Falkirk RSVP and Kirkcaldy 'A' did well and Duntocher were a little unfortunate to finish in one of the relegation places, only $\frac{1}{2}$ pt behind them.

In the Second Division, the very formidable Kafka Kastle team were clear winners but the other promotion place was a close finish, with Crowwood 'A' just edging out Glasgow Lads and Letter Checks.

The Third and Fourth Divisions also produced exciting finales, with the very strong line-ups of the Establishment and Cathcart 'A' producing a tie to give next season's Division Two teams something to think about and Border Reeverers did well to finish in top place above a strong Cathcart 'B' team in Division 4.

It is most gratifying that another excellent entry of teams has been received for the 1983/84 season and this is a tribute to the efforts of Ken Gordon, the Controller. Details of the teams in each Division are given after last season's detailed results, along with the detailed pairings for the 1983/84 League.



EXTRACTS FROM MINUTES OF ICCF CONGRESS - POZNAN, 3-11th SEPTEMBER 1983

The ICCF Congress took place in the Hotel Poznan, at Poznan, Poland from 3rd to 11th September 1983 and was organised by the Polish Federation. Meetings of the Praesidium and the Commissions were held as part of the Congress.

Those taking part in the Congress attended a reception at the Poznan Town Hall, given by the Deputy Head of the Poznan District, Mrs. Zofia Dabrowska. Besides this, there was an excursion to the city surroundings and to the castle of Kórnik, a sightseeing tour and a visit to a concert given by the Poznan Philharmonic Orchestra with the violinist Konstanty Andrzej Kulka as soloist.

In honour of the Congress, an International Master Chess Tournament was organised, and a simultaneous exhibition was given by the OTB and CC Grandmaster, Lothar Schmid.

ICCF President Hans-Werner von Massow was in the chair, with 31 delegates and members in attendance.

The participants were greeted by the President of the Polish Federation, Stanislaw Kania, who mentioned the part played by Poland in the development of chess. He honoured the memory of the late Frau Bertl von Massow who died on 27th February 1983 and spoke in appreciation of her extensive work for the development of the European Tournaments over more than two decades. He recalled how the Polish Chess Federation had awarded to her its Golden Medal of Honour on the occasion of the ICCF Congress at Warsaw in 1973. Bearing in mind that after ten years, ICCF was again holding its Congress in Poland, he expressed the hope that it would become a tradition that ICCF came back to Poland every ten years.

The ICCF President, Hans-Werner von Massow, thanked the Polish Federation for the warm welcome as well as for the excellent preparations for the Congress and particularly thanked their President, Stanislaw Kania, and his colleagues, T. Peretjatkowicz, A. Malyszko and T. Baranowski. He mentioned that Poznan had long been well known as a chess city and the oldest chess club of the city was founded in 1839. In the same year, a correspondence chess match began between Poznan and Berlin.

ICCF Vice-President, H.J. Mostert (NL), honoured the memory of those colleagues who had died since the previous year's Praesidium Meeting, namely:

Frau Bertl von Massow (BRD), Honorary Member of the ICCF. Head of the European Tournament Office for 23 years.

H. Norell (S), Honorary Member of the ICCF, who worked for many years with great success as Tournament Secretary of the CC Olympiads.

Dr. G. Mandolfo (I), for his work as Head of the World Tournament Office.

Congress unanimously adopted proposals for two honours.

Bertl von Massow Medals should be produced in gold and silver and awarded in recognition of valuable work for the ICCF.

These medals in gold and silver will be awarded respectively for 15 years and 10 years of faithful service to ICCF as Delegate of a national federation, as a member of the Praesidium or the Commissions, the European CC Organisation Committee or as Tournament Secretary as well as Team Captain of a winning or highly placed team in the CC Olympiads or Continental Team Tournaments.

Honorary Membership of the ICCF was bestowed upon Lektor Arne Henriksen (Denmark), who celebrated his 80th birthday this year. He was the Danish Delegate to ICCF and Tournament Secretary for the European Tournaments for many years.

Following the Report of the General Secretary Congress unanimously accepted the Federation of Algeria as the 57th member of ICCF and ratified the decisions of the previous year's Praesidium to accept the membership of the Federation of Singapore as well as the transfer of membership from CCLA to the USA umbrella organisation, USPCF.

The Report of the Tournament Director indicated that in the years 1968-82, 73,191 players from 112 countries took part in ICCF tournaments.

In the Report of the World Tournament Office the Tournament Director had appointed R. Wikman (SF) Head of the World Tournament Office as successor to the late CC friend, Dr. G. Mandolfo, and O. Jakobsen (DK) was appointed Central Tournament Secretary for the Thematic Tournaments.

In the Report of the European Tournament Office as successor to the late Frau Bertl von Massow, Nol van't Riet was appointed Head of the European Tournament Office. The Final of European CC Team Championship II and the Preliminary Round of European CC Team Championship III which started this year, holds the supplementary title IN MEMORIAM BERTEL VON MASSOW

The following reports were received and considered:

- The Report concerning Tournaments in North America
- The Report concerning Tournaments in Latin America
- The Report of the Liaison Officer to FIDE
- The Report of the Treasurer
- The Report of the Auditor
- The Report of the Rules Commission
- The Report of the Tele-Chess Commission
- The Report of the Documentation Commission

The Report of the Qualifications Commission comprised the outcome of the meetings of the Commission held during the Congress.

The Commission indicated that the enlargement of the three preliminary groups of the 10th CC Olympiad from 11 teams each to 12 teams since the 1982 Paris meeting, means that the half norm score for each player is increased by one point.

Congress ratified the allocations to 6 groups for the Semi-final of the 15th World CC Championship presented by the Commission, with the Tournament Secretary, Reg Gillman (GB). Authorisation was also given to Tournament Secretary K.H. Boese (BRD) to start the presented groups for 1/2-Final XIII shortly with three groups respectively; 4 players qualify for the Final of the World CC Championship XIII.

From the Report of the Working Party for Rating it emerged that a circular concerning previously presented lists had produced gratifying results. The Commission anticipated being able to offer the 1984 Praesidium Meeting a Rating list as well as an explanation of the system for the future.

The ICCF President warmly congratulated the new title holders of the ICCF.

Matters pertaining to the Rules of Play

Congress decided the following new wording for Paragraph 45.

The title 'International Arbiter of the ICCF' is not limited in time and shall be awarded:

- (a) for four years' successful work as Tournament Secretary of the ICCF Promotion and/or Title Tournament without break
- (b) for six years' successful work as Tournament Secretary of the ICCF Promotion and/or Title Tournaments with a break
- (c) remains unaltered.

Matters pertaining to the Tournament Rules

Paragraph 7 now reads as follows: "Should an impossible, invalid or illegible move be transmitted, the recipient shall query his opponent by return post. In this case, the guilty player shall be penalised with 5 days supplementary thinking time."

TOURNAMENT ARRANGEMENTS

A proposal from USPCF to create an Anglo-Pacific Tournament Office was welcomed by Congress.

Congress decided norms for the team tournament '1st Latin Cup America-Europe'.

Congress unanimously agreed to authorise the following invitation tournaments:

Team Tournament 'Danube - River of Friendship' organised by the CC Commission of the Ukrainian SSR. It will be played over 10 boards and commence at the beginning of 1984.

Bernard Friedman Memorial, a Grandmaster tournament organised by the Canadian Federation with 15 players to start around February 1985.

Tournament '100 Years Scottish Chess Association', a Grandmaster tournament organised by the Scottish CC Association (SCCA). Taking part will be 5 Grandmasters, 7 International Masters and 3 players without title. Commencement date - mid-1984.

INTERNAL MATTERS

On a suggestion of the Treasurer, a discussion took place regarding the desirability of increasing the tournament entry fees. The Treasurer was requested to seek the opinion of the national federations.

EXTERNAL MATTERS

Congress resolved to apply for admission to UNESCO.

ELECTIONS

In accordance with the Constitution, there followed the election of the Praesidium and the Auditor for the period 1st January 1984 until 31st December 1987. The present General Secretary of the ICCF, Dr. B. Lukáš (CSSR), had indicated that he was unable to stand, and the present Treasurer of the ICCF, J-A Cornu (CH) was unable to stand for business reasons. The ICCF President thanked them both for the valuable work.

An invitation from the Yugoslavian Federation for the 1984 Praesidium Meeting was accepted with sincere thanks. The venue was given as Vrnjacka Banja and the dates 3rd-12th September 1984.

An invitation from the Scottish Federation for the 1985 Congress was accepted with sincere thanks. The Congress will take place near Edinburgh, 31st August - 8th September 1985.

An invitation from the Australian Federation was accepted for the 1986 Praesidium Meeting, the Netherlands Federation for the 1987 Congress, as well as the Finnish Federation for the 1991 Congress.

With words of sincere thanks to all participants and above all to the host federation Poland for the excellent arrangements, the ICCF President closed the meeting.

GRADING MATTERS (by Douglas Livie)

Once again, interest in correspondence chess has increased and even more players are on the verge of entering our ever-growing grading list, which now has 146 names. Those players who have not yet played sufficient games against recognised or provisionally graded players do not at present appear in the main published list, but some are included in the supplementary list.

Special congratulations are due to Philip Giulian and Douglas Bryson. The former, by winning the Scottish Correspondence Chess Championship, has achieved his third qualifying norm and will therefore be awarded the title of 'Scottish Correspondence Chess Master'. On behalf of all members, I congratulate Philip and we wish him continued success for the future. Douglas Bryson achieved the fine distinction of winning the British Correspondence Chess Championship with a score of 8/11. He is still the highest recognised graded player of the SCCA.

Games other than in SCCA or ICCF events can be graded only if the competitor advises the Grading Officer of the details of the event within two months of its commencement.

The main grading list once again consists of:

- a. Recognised players - those who have twenty or more recorded results against recognised or provisionally graded players.
- b. Provisionally graded players (shown by asterisk) - those who have at least eight recorded results against recognised or provisionally graded players.

INTERNATIONAL REPORT

Xth Olympiad - Preliminary Section 2

Team Captain, Ken McAlpine, reports "that Scotland is making encouraging progress in their first venture in the ICCF's premier team event. After one year's play, in which our 6 players each have opponents from 11 other countries, only 11 of the 66 games have been completed. Our score to date is 3 wins, 5 draws and 3 losses, which is an indicator of how difficult it is to win at the top level of Correspondence Chess. However, we have a strong team and, of course, with Douglas Bryson the current British Champion on Board 2, Scotland is confident that it will make a good showing in its Preliminary Section".

Winners so far have been Douglas Bryson (against International Master Svenningsson of Sweden, who played in the last World Championship Final). David Kilgour (against Christoffel of Switzerland) and Philip Giulian (against Spodny of Czechoslovakia). The first two were most impressive victories and the game scores are given below.

THE INTERNATIONAL CORRESPONDENCE CHESS FEDERATION

Members of the Scottish Correspondence Chess Association are entitled to compete in the Class Tournaments of the ICCF, via BPCF. These are very well organised and highly recommended. There is no need to fear language problems or difficulty with the international numeric notation, which is fully explained on the back page of the rules which are sent to each competitor at the time of entry. It is not expensive and the time allowance is more generous than for Scottish CCA games, with 30 days for every ten moves, not counting time in the post and one can exceed the time limit once in every game. If one is interested in foreign stamps or picture postcards, it is often possible to exchange these with opponents and build up a beautiful collection.

The tournaments are organised in two divisions, the World Tournament and the European Tournament. Each has five classes, Master Class, Higher Class and Classes I, II and III (Class III being the weakest). Entry may be made at any time and all play all groups are started whenever sufficient entries are received. New entrants may choose to begin in either of Classes I, II or III and the winner of each group is promoted to the next higher class. Strong players who wish to begin in Master Class or Higher Class should send details of recent CC achievements and OTB grade (if any) with their entry. If agreed, the entry is for one group only and the competitor must score one-third of the possible points before entering further groups in the same class.

The World Tournament is composed of 7-player groups (with 7-player and 15-player groups only in Master Class) but the European Tournament has both 7 and 15-player groups in all five classes. These are single pairings, that is to say, one plays only one game against each opponent. In a 7-player group, one would have six opponents and in a 15-player group, fourteen opponents. Players may compete in several groups at the same time, either in the World or European Tournament or both, but may not compete in different classes except to finish off games after promotion.

There are also Thematic Tournaments organised in 5-player World groups, all play all with double pairings. The games start from a predetermined opening position in the theme selected. In 1984, the themes will be Sicilian-Najdorf, Ruy Lopez-Breyer, Sicilian Zc3. (See elsewhere in News Bulletin for more information).

The moves are sent by postcard and to make sure there is no mistake, you always acknowledge your opponent's move by repeating it back to him with the reply move. Specially printed international CC cards are available from the Scottish CCA, but ordinary plain postcards are quite satisfactory.

The entry fee is £2.00 for a 7-player group and £3.00 for a 15-player group, and payable to BPCF. Write your name and address clearly, state that you are a member of the Scottish CCA and send your entry to:

Also playing in a European Master Class 7 player Section is George Pyrich. We wish them all success in following Alan into the Semi-Final stages.

The following interesting letter was received from Mr. G.A. Morton from Stewarton, Ayrshire:

The Classification Tournament

Is this tournament seen to live up to its name if there is but one group (other than that of any rejected entries) and this year the two competitors with SCCA grades differ by 52 pts (416 Elo)? In particular, this can hardly enhance its appeal to the beginner and lower grading range seeking not to be comprehensibly outplayed. Yet it may be to these players (who are unlikely to meet with success in a Major and do not fancy the handicap structure) that the Classification could offer most.

It may be optimistic to advertise this tournament in groups of seven. If, as in 1982/3, entries should exceed seven, there could be more than one section, using double pairings if necessary (which at least has the benefit of reducing stamp consumption). For example, it is possible to arrange six or eight games per player:

Arguably, the smaller groups would be better suited to the lower gradings and there the double pairings have more significance.

That may be all very well if the entries are received. As a prompt, there could be a brief article on the aims and form of the Classification in the Bulletin. Whether 'catchy' adverts (running the risk of being thought silly) would attract more attention is debatable. Possibilities - if they could be truthful - might include:
