ICCF World Cup 21



Mariusz Wojnar, the Polish ICCF Delegate and Tournament Organiser, writes to announce that World Cup 21 will start on 1st October, 2015, with the closing date for entries 1st September.

As with previous World Cups, the event will be organised in three stages: Preliminaries, Semi-finals and Final. The Preliminaries will complete on 1st May 2017; the Semi-finals are expected to start on 1st September 2017 and the Finals are expected to start on 1st September 2019. Books and chess materials will be available as prizes for the Preliminaries and Semi-finals, with cash prizes available for the Final.

Players may enter for an unlimited number of Preliminary groups, but have no more than two places in the Semi-finals and one in the Final. Players who qualified for World Cup 19 and 20 Finals will be entitled to play in the Semi-final stage of World Cup 21 and the winners of WC 19 and 20 Finals will be eligible to participate in World Cup Final 21.

Players may enter through their National Federations (the SCCA entry fee per section is £8.50) or, where eligible, via the ICCF Direct Entry system. For further information and to register, please contact George Pyrich on international@scottishcca.co.uk before mid-August.

ICCF Veterans' World Cup 8



Richard Hall, president of EFCC (the English CC Federation), writes to announce that VWC8 will start on 1st September, 2015, with the closing date for entries 1st August. As with previous VWCs, the event will be organised in three stages, which will

allow several players from each group stage to advance to the Semi-finals and Final.

The number of promotions will depend on total entries received, but it is envisaged that groups at each stage will comprise 13 players (12 games) played by webserver with a rate of play of 10 moves in 40 days. Playing time in each stage will be 18 months, with a fixed closing date specified at the outset.

VWCs are open to all players who are 60 years old or more at the start date of the tournament. Although the number of preliminary groups which each player may enter is unlimited, no player will qualify for more than two Semifinal groups or more than one place in the Final. Players may enter through their National Federations (the SCCA entry fee per section is £8.50) or, where eligible, via the ICCF Direct Entry system. ICCF 2015 World Championship Candidates



Gian-Maria Tani, ICCF Title Tournaments Commissioner, writes to announce the candidates stage of the 35th World Championship which will start on 20th September. The following players are eligible for the 35th candidates:

- the participants of one of the previous or running finals who scored at least 50% of the possible points.
- the participants in one of the previous or running candidates stage who finished in 2nd place (in the exceptional event of only one qualifying place for the final being available), 3rd or 4th place, or scored at least 60% of the possible points but did not qualify for the final
- the first and second placed players in every semi-final group.
- the first and second placed players in a final of the ICCF World Cup tournament.
- the first and second placed players from the acknowledged Zonal Championships of Category IX or higher.
- all previous World Correspondence Chess champions.
- the holders of the Grandmaster Title with at least 5 Grandmaster norms
- those players who have a fixed rating of 2600 and above, as at July 1, 2014, or from the current FIDE list.

Candidates sections normally have 13 players with the possibility for the TTC to extend them to 15 or 17 players (or reduce to 11 players) if appropriate in special situations. Normally, only four Candidates sections are started each year with 1st & 2nd qualifying for a final.

Mariusz Wojnar, the Polish ICCF delegate, writes to invite entries to the 2nd International Clergy Polish CC Championship.




This event is open to clergymen worldwide who have a passion for chess.

SCCA Championship 2014-15






We haven't had many tied finishes in the Championship over the years, and our practice historically was to share the title.

Minutes of the 37th AGM

On the proposal of Gordon Anderson seconded by George Pyrich the minute of the meeting held on 8th June 2014 was accepted as an accurate record and approved.

Matters arising from the 37th AGM

President's Remarks

Iain Mackintosh summarised another active and rewarding year for the SCCA.

The 2013-14 Championship was won outright by David Cumming (7/8). The 2014-15 Championship is building to an exciting climax, with Eoin Campbell, Geoff Lloyd and Robert Montgomery all in close contention. Raymond Burridge won both 2014 Premier sections outright, scoring 4½/5 in both. Robert Gilbert again won the Open with a score of 9½/10, narrowly missing the 100% Club. Raymond Burridge collected the Challengers' medal. Social Stars and Hounds of the Scheming Mind shared the spoils with 10/16 in division 1 of the Webserver League, while Civil Service A won division 2 (13/16). BCCA A triumphed in the Postal League with 7½/10. The 3rd Webserver Open has progressed to the finals of its two competitions (<2000 and 2000+). The 2nd Annual Best Game Prize was adjudicated by Richard Beecham and won by Charles O'Neill-McAleenan. Gordon Anderson and Kevin Paine were awarded IA titles after their work in the ICCF Veterans' World Cups organised by the SCCA.

Internationally, we continued to participate actively in both team and individual events (refer George's report below).

Once more the SCCA has been indebted to its hard-working committee members and tournament directors, all of whom deserve great praise for their efforts and commitment. David Savage was awarded an engraved quaich for his long and distinguished service in organising the Postal League.

Secretary's Report

No formal secretary's report had been received. Membership renewals were initially slightly down, but recovered after reminders were issued. Life and patron memberships remained steady while donations increased. Our website hosting was very reliable and some content changes were made to improve navigation. We introduced a Facebook page which can be accessed at: http://facebook.com/scottishcca and which has attracted a respectable worldwide following. The online magazine was produced on schedule all year, while subscribers to the printed version held steady.

Treasurer's Report

Gordon Anderson presented a full set of accounts and once again expressed his thanks to Alan Hind for an efficient audit. We ended the year to 31st March 2015 showing a surplus of £272 (2014: £142) and net assets of £10,754 (2014: £10,482).

The Accounts reveal a satisfactory financial position. Income in the 12 month period amounted to £2,392 (2014: £2,584), the main contributors to the fall in income being reduced subscriptions to the 100 Club, a reduction in income from entries to ICCF competitions and no costs being incurred with our website ISP Connection fees (donated). The falls in income in these areas was offset a little by increases in donations received, bank interest and magazine income.

Expenditure in the year was £2,120 (2014: £2,443). The reduction in expenditure results from a significant reduction in the costs incurred for prizes, reductions in monies paid to ICCF in respect of tournament entries, and reduced postage for the SCCA magazine. These reductions were offset to some extent by our donations to both the Welsh Correspondence Chess Federation in respect of the ICCF Congress to be hosted by the WCCF this year and a donation to Chess Scotland to assist with the funding of the Glorney Cup which they recently hosted.

Our overall financial position remains very acceptable. Iain Mackintosh proposed a vote of thanks to Gordon and Alan Hind which was agreed by all. Gordon moved adoption of the audited accounts, seconded by Alan Borwell and unanimously agreed.

International Secretary's Report

George Pyrich reported that we are currently lying 11th in the semi-finals of the 10th European Team Championships. We have entered the 6th Champions League, fielding the Lewis Chessmen and Scottish Claymores teams. The Scottish Claymores (different team) finished 4th in their section of the European Postal Cup, narrowly missing out on a final spot.

New friendly matches were started against Switzerland, Iceland, Wales, NatCor (affiliated to EFCC) and Netherlands. Our form has reverted to type, with no wins in the last year! We continue to supply individual entries to a broad range of ICCF events, with the 8th Veterans World Cup and 21st World Cup being the most recent.

Through Alan Borwell, we continue to organise and sponsor cycles 2-4 of the ICCF Veterans' World Cup. VWC2 is now complete and was won by Vladimir Stepanovich Sergeev IM from Russia, ahead of Vytautas Sutkus IM from Lithuania and Juan Andres Enricci SIM from Argentina. The three medallists have received engraved Quaichs presented by the Scottish CCA. Cycles 3-4 are proceeding to schedule.

The 2015 ICCF Congress will be held in Cardiff from 16th to 22nd August. In addition to ICCF business, a meeting is scheduled between representatives of the 3 UK National Federations which will discuss the format and organisation of future British events including the British championships.

Iain Mackintosh proposed a vote of thanks to George which was unanimously agreed. Alan Borwell moved adoption of George's report, seconded by Gordon Anderson and unanimously agreed.



2015/3 Grading List

The third ICCF grading list of 2015 has been published and the new grades are based on 3 months' results reported between 1 March and 31 May 2015. The grades will apply to internationally graded games starting between 1 July and 30 September 2015.

There were no additions or deletions in this list. Membership numbers are retained for easy reinstatement should any previously removed players return to the board.

Kevin Paine moved into the 2300+ grading band for the first time on this list – well done to him!

More century games milestones were reached in this quarter. Andrew Macmillen went past 700 games; Ian Marshall is now a 500+veteran; while Stephen Clark and Douglas Harvey notched up their first centuries.

Our resident games guzzlers were again very active, with Raymond Burridge completing 54 ties, just ahead of Martin Hardwick on 50. Carlos Almarza Mato (41), Eoin Campbell (36) and David Cumming (32) all kept pretty busy.

You need to complete 12 ICCF-eligible games to obtain a provisional rating (* below). Provisional ratings apply until 30 games have been processed. Rating changes are denoted by arrows. Email grader@scottishcca.co.uk if you have any queries.



Now resident in Spain, it's not so easy to obtain new English language books – of course I can still order online but delivery to a Spanish Post Box takes a good deal longer and also is a wee bit more expensive. So, this time I shall write about the increasing trend towards electronic books and other downloads and refer specifically to 2 publications, ChessBase magazine and Chess Informant.

Both are longstanding chess "publishers" although of course ChessBase is largely but not exclusively "electronic" whilst Chess Informant has only fairly recently offered an electronic option. I'm fairly sure that every serious correspondence player has heard of both (if you haven't then where have you been?!).



Belgrade based Chess Informant started life in the late 60's offering a largely language less bi-annual publication containing an 800 or so games selection with only a small proportion of these containing any annotations although with a fair number of diagrams. Other than this you got the usual sections of winning combinations, studies and endgames as well as several pages of cross-tables of recently concluded events. In the last few years however it has introduced some fairly substantial and welcome changes. Nowadays it is quarterly and has adopted a format more akin to a magazine in book format. Whilst there are now only about 200 or so games per issue, most are generously and well annotated. The hard copy still runs to about 350 or so pages but format and presentation are much improved since the early days. Recent innovations include regular contributions by GM Morozevich who provides a fascinating section entitled "Midnight in Moscow", an insight into his unique perspective on openings and also sections on various middle and endgame features by reputable GM's such as Marin, Ivan Sokolov and acclaimed endgame virtuoso GM Karsten Mueller. There are also several articles on developments in topical opening lines. Another recently introduced feature on Women's chess is provided by Scots GM Ketevan Arakhamia-Grant and helps to provide its overall almost magazine like presentation. Old favourites such as "Combinations", "Endgames" and "Studies" remain. About a year or so ago an electronic

format was made available containing all the material to be found in the printed copy. A Chess Informant Reader can be downloaded free of charge enabling access to all the available material although, quite significantly, the files are also available in ChessBase format which can easily be transferred over to your pc's ChessBase programme. Thus far I haven't tried downloading the Reader to my i-Pad and so can't comment further. One final comment I can offer here is one first made by the late Danish GM Bent Larsen who was quoted as saying that Chess Informant was the publication only really necessary as it contained all the information that anyone could readily absorb – studying other chess publications in addition to Informant were too much for the brain to absorb and could be discarded!



The "opposition" Hamburg based ChessBase provides a huge number of specialist DVD's, largely on Openings, but most available also by download. Our interest here is its "ChessBase Magazine" a bi-monthly presentation providing another substantial amount of material. Every issue contains about 5 or 6 reports with almost all games annotated, many by the players, from recent "super GM" events as well as file containing about 1,000 or so recent games from other events. Additionally there are usually about a dozen or so openings articles on topical variations (I find most of these to be a wee bit obscure or rather they've never featured in my games!). Finally, there are the old favourites -Endgames, Combinations and Studies. The "hard copy" is a DVD along with a well-produced wee 32 page booklet whilst the download version contains all the available material. The magazine bills itself as being "the publication the professionals use" - probably true and although whilst I do enjoy the games when I have time available I do find it all to be a wee bit "heavy". One small gripe I would mention is that ChessBase can be used only on Windows – there's been a wee announcement for some time now on their web site that this is so and that they'll get round to adding access for Mac but have never done so (I wasn't going to mention "New in Chess" but they do provide access to both). It seems to me that with i-Pads and the like becoming increasingly popular they're missing out on a good business opportunity.

Veterans World Cup 7 started on 1st September 2014 with 33 Prelim. Groups.

There are 6 Scottish CC participants playing in 8 groups. After only 10 months of play, most Groups have more than 75% of games finished. The only SCCA player likely to qualify for the VWC7 Semifinals is Peter Bennett with 6.5/10pts with 2 games to finish. Alan Borwell with 5.5/10 and 6/11 is unlikely to reach a top 2 placing whilst Eoin Campbell finished with a creditable 7/12 in his group.

Veterans World Cup 8 was announced in May 2015, with the closing date for entries being 1st August 2015. The likely start date is 1st September 2015. It will be organised by the English CCF.

General Information

ICCF is the International Correspondence Chess Federation. ICCF was founded in 1951 as a reincarnation of the ICCA (International Correspondence Chess Association), itself founded in 1945 as successor to the IFSB (Internationaler Fernschachbund), founded in 1928.

ICCF organises a huge variety of tournaments for individual and team play; operates a worldwide rating system and awards GM, SIM and IM titles to male and female players to recognise strength and performance. Most play is based now on the ICCF webserver, with a residue of postal and email events. Principal tournaments are:

World Individual (www.iccf-webchess.com)

- World Championship. Annual cycles progress through preliminary, semi-final, candidate and final stages.
- World Cups. These include Adult, Junior and the highly popular Veterans events.
- Norm Tournaments. For aspiring IM, SIM and GM players, categorised by rating strength.
- Promotion Tournaments. For middle-strong players, spanning Open, Higher and Master classes.
- Aspirer Tournaments. For beginners and lower-graded players.
- Thematic Tournaments. Organised by opening variations (see opposite).

World Team (www.iccf-webchess.com)

- Olympiads. National team event, 6-player teams, played to a very high standard.
- Champions League. National, cross-national and scratch 4-player teams, several divisions.

European Zone (www.iccf-europa.com)

- European Individual Championship.
- European National Team Championship.

Other

- Friendly Internationals. ICCF member organisations play team events, usually 2 games per player.
- Invitation/Memorial Events. To commemorate anniversaries and deceased officials and players.
- Chess 960. New events featuring Fischer/Random chess opening positions.

SCCA members are eligible to enter all ICCF events, though Scottish nationality is required for national representation.

Current tournament fees are shown on the Fees page of the SCCA website, and all Scottish players competing in ICCF events have bookmarks from the SCCA site to the relevant ICCF cross-table for easy checking of results.
