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EDITORIAL by Alan Borwell No. 16 - May 1985

Since our last issue, we have had an important meeting of Council and of the Committee responsible for planning the ICCF Congress in September. The notice of our forthcoming AGM is included in the Secretarial Notes below.

One most welcome development was the decision by the SCA Council to provide us with a generous contribution from the Scottish Chess Centenary Fund towards the prizes of the Scottish Centenary International Correspondence Tournament (a progress report on this event appears on page 5). This donation will enable us to apply most of the funds we have raised towards the cost of this event and the hosting of the ICCF Congress at Peebles, to the very substantial costs of the Congress.

Invitations have now been issued to all ICCF member countries to send delegates and friends to Peebles and we are very hopeful that Scotland will attract a record attendance. The efficient organisation of the Congress will be a considerable task and any members willing to assist, particularly with transport to and from Scotland's airports/railway stations, are asked to contact any of our principal office-bearers.

The organising of both of these events will help to further enhance Scotland's already considerable reputation in ICCF circles, as also will our organising of the recently started 2nd North Atlantic Team Tourney (for detailed pairings, see pages 22 and 23).

This edition is a little late (mainly due to your Editor's other commitments!) but it is intended to maintain a regular quarterly cycle of News Bulletins. The next edition therefore will be published before the ICCF Congress and a further issue will be produced after that event, around the end of the current SCCA season.

SECRETARIAL NOTES by Alan Hind

The Scottish Chess Centenary Cup is now under way. Notification of pairings was issued just before Easter and the official start date is 1st May 1985. This event is being controlled by Douglas Livie. An encouraging response was received for this tournament with 15 sections of 7 competitors.

The 1984/85 Classification tournament has just been completed and the results appear later in this Bulletin.

The Association's Annual General Meeting will be held on Sunday 23rd June 1985 at 2.30 p.m. in Chess Suppliers(Scotland) Ltd premises at 15 Hope Street Glasgow (opposite Central Station).

HANDICAP TOURNAMENT (by Allan Hislop)

This tourney continues its popularity, with some 25 players taking part with around eighty games in progress. The season started off with about sixty games requested and during the last few months we have had a steady application from new entrants requesting games. It is one of the advantages of the Handicap that games can be started any time. I would also like to repeat the point for the Handicap Tournament that the adjudication date set out on the scorecard does not necessarily mean that a game must be sent in then for adjudication. It can be carried on until completed, providing both players agree.

If a game is carried beyond the adjudication date, then the next date for adjudication is that date in the next season. Since a game cannot be sent for adjudication unless 30 moves have been played, it follows that if say a game is started in May, it is most likely that it will carry on into next season, since the required number of moves will not have been played. If more games are required, then direct request should be made to the controller, providing that you are a current SCCA member.

Finally, I must apologise to Mr. G.M. Anderson who is a Class One player and who recently asked for five opponents. I have not been able under the rules to pair him so far. Could any player in Class One or Two who is thinking of starting new games now, please let me know.

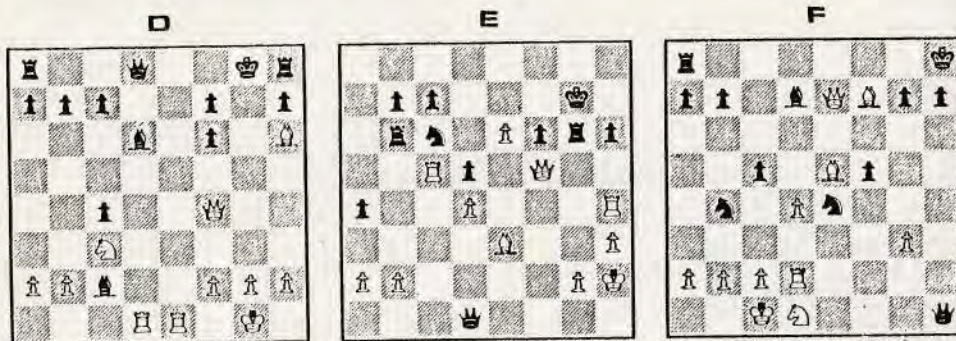
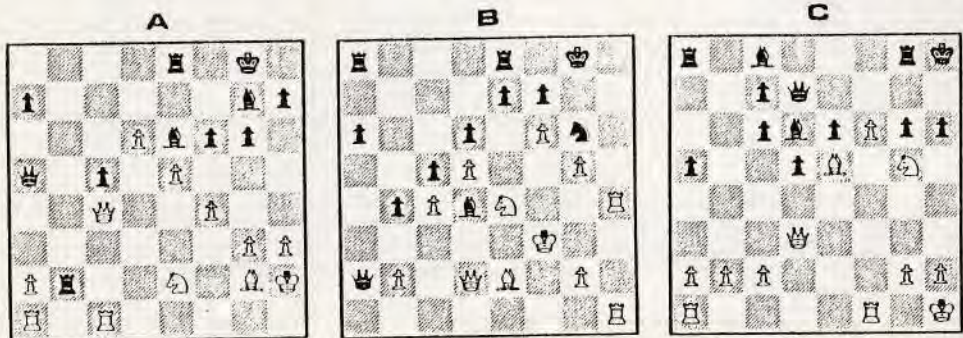

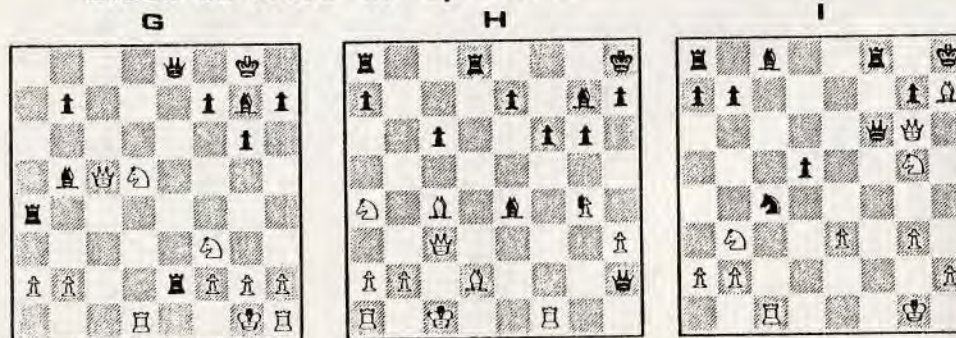

ASCENSION TOURNAMENTS ?

International CC in this country suffers a little from translation. In the original German, the class tournaments of the ICCF are called, "Aufstiegsturniere". A nice word which trips easily from the German tongue and means that one can go up in the tournaments. It has been given in English as "Ascension Tournaments" which seems to mean that the tournaments go up.

The term "Ascension Tournaments" is rarely used because it simply does not convey the right idea in the English language. We call them "World Tournaments" or "European Tournaments" which is how they are divided, or we call them "Class Tournaments" which is how they are sub-divided, i.e. Master Class, Higher Class, Classes I, II and III (Class III is suitable for beginners). But Ascension? Yuk! It has a sort of religious connotation which is fine for a piece of organ music but hardly suitable for correspondence chess.

And so, having called them "Class Tournaments" for the past twenty years or so, I have given a little thought to the correct translation of the word, "Aufstiegsturniere" and lo and behold, it was there all the time, just waiting to be discovered!

Ta-rah, ta-rah, tum, tum ta-rah!

No? Oh, well, I suppose it doesn't set the world alight. But it surely must be better than that horrible "Ascension" stuff. In any case, whatever you call them, they are extremely well organized and highly recommended. Why not give it a whirl?

The tournaments are organized in 7-player sections which start as soon as entries are received from seven different countries. So in theory, you should get six opponents, each from a different country. In practice however, one or two countries predominate and one sometimes has two opponents from Russia or East Germany. When you start to play in ICCF, you can choose whether to begin in Class I, II or III. If you pick Class II, it is necessary to win a section before you can go up to Class I. If you score less than a third of the possible points, you go down to Class III.

The entry fee is £2.50 payable to BPCF and sent to Michael Anderson, 3 Winterfield Gdns, DUNS, Berwickshire, TD11 3EZ. In the European Tournament only, there are 15-player sections for which the entry fee is £3.50 (a bargain). Be sure to tell Michael which tournament you wish to enter and which class. And especially tell him that you are a member of the Scottish C.C.A. I am sure you will enjoy your games.

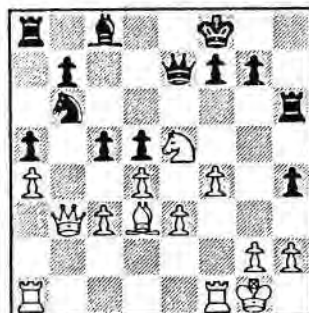

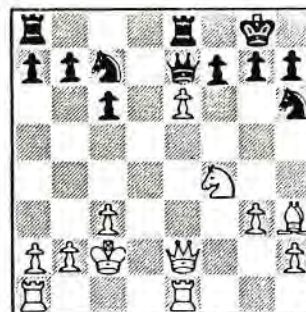

By keeping the Queens on, Black puts greater pressure on the White position with the B on f3 still under threat and a continuation of the attack threatened with ...Bf2 etc. I subsequently found that the position after Black's 15th had been reached in Foigel-Monin, Frunze 1977, when White tried 16 Nfd4. This also proved hopeless due to the great activity of the Black pieces by 16 ...Bb4ch 17 Nc3 Bg4 18 Qd2 Rae8 19 Nde2 Rf2 0 : 1

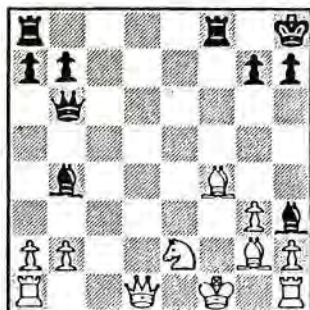

For these reasons, I intended simply (18 Nc3) ...Bh3 as in some lines I wanted my KR on the f file as an exchange on f4 followed by ...Qe3ch might be desirable. Black would then be fully developed with the QR about to join in the final attack. The text move loses from another direction.

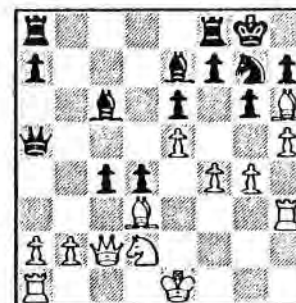

I am at present trying to arrange some new Internationals to meet the demand of the members. Contact has been made with Italy and Israel. It is also hoped that the long awaited match against Argentina can now be arranged.

These three matches will be regarded as full Internationals, but I have a team list from the National Correspondence Chess Club based in England and this match will be starting shortly. This match with the N.C.C.C. is not regarded as a full International and therefore I will not be charging the fl board fee!

The present match with France is progressing well with a few results now coming through (see below). Our match with Poland is going very slowly and many of you taking part are having long delays with mail taking many weeks in both directions. All I can recommend is that you play with patience and stick to the I.C.C.F. Rules by repeating your move and also by letting me know immediately of any problem, not 3 months later!

The last few results in our match against West Germany has now been decided and the final results table is given below, the adjudicated games were all in our favour but it has made very little difference to the final result - we were well beaten!
