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# 35 Aniversario de la FECAP International Open Tournament



The Cuban Correspondence Chess Federation (FECAP) is pleased to announce the International Open Tournament on the occasion of its 35th anniversary. We cordially invite CC players from all countries to participate in this tournament.

The tournament consisting of 3 sections will be played in one phase, using the ICCF 2024/3 rating list:

Section A for players with a rating of 2300 or higher Section B for players with a rating between 2000 - 2299 Section C for players with a rating of 1999 or lower

The tournament will be played on the ICCF server with triple block time control: tournament duration of 350 days (50 days initial clock, 75 days initial bank, 1 day increment for the first 50 moves).

The tournament will be rated and valid for obtaining norms for ICCF titles, meeting all conditions required by ICCF.

Registered players grouped by rating will be placed in groups of 11, 13 or 15 players in rating order so that all group members have a similar rating. The number of groups will depend on the number of registrations. A maximum of 2 registrations will be allowed, with the second registration the player will be assigned to the group following the first group.

The tournament start date is September 30, 2024.

Registration and payment of the entry fee for the 35th Aniversario de la FECAP International Open Tournament must be done via the DE system on the ICCF server by opening the **Cuba menu in New Events**.

The entry fee is  $9 \in$  and registrations must be received no later than September 10, 2024.

- Time control is Triple Block system for a 350 day event, with 75 days initial bank and 1 day increment for the first 50 moves.
- The tournaments will be played in a single phase at Triple Block time control for a 350 days event.
- The tournament will be rated and valid to obtain the norms for ICCF titles in groups that meet all the conditions required by ICCF.
- Up to 2 registrations will be allowed, with the second registration the player will be paired in the group following the first group.
- The registered players will be allocated in groups of 11, 13 or 15 players in ranking order, so that all group members have a similar rating.
- The number of groups will depend on the number of registrations.
- The registration fee is 9 Euros.
- Entries and fees must be received no later than September 10, 2024.

# 2024/3 Grading List

The third ICCF grading list of 2024 is published and new grades are based on 3 months' results reported between 1 Apr and 30 June 2024. The grades will apply to internationally graded games starting between 1 Jul and 30 Sep 2024.


It appears that there were no new norms in the latest rating period.

There was 1 addition to the list, returning after a period of inactivity. Sadly, we have lost 2 from the list, Graham Morrison and David Cumming, who have passed away. My personal condolences to their families and they will be sadly missed. The most significant rating moves were Andrew MacMillen (+81), Derek Price (+80), John Dunn (+66), James Murray (+43), Benjamin Major (+42), Andrew Taylor (+41), Colin McGregor (+34), Carlos Almarza Mato (+31), Robert Bruce, Martin Hardwick, Robert Montgomery, Wilf Taylor (all +22), Iain Mackintosh (+21) and Geoffrey Lloyd (+20).

New games centurions were Martin Hardwick (2000+), Ian Sneddon (800+) and Steve Pettigrew (200+). Highest recorded games this quarter were Carlos Almarza Mato and Robert Bruce (44), Martin Hardwick (41) and Iain Sneddon (35).

# **Introduction**

May 2024 was a dreadful month for SCCA with 2 deaths recorded among our top players. First to be announced was Graham James Morrison following a stroke in his adopted town of Lytham St Annes. He was closely followed by David Roderick Cumming who died in his sleep in Inverness.

We celebrate the lives of both players by publishing some of their great moments at the chessboard.

This is easier to do in David's case as he has a long history of SCCA membership and tournament play.

Graham joined in May 2023, and we published some of his Edinburgh-London games in editions 164-165. However, we have unearthed a gem from 2022-24 to remember him by.

The two highest-placed players in each division shall be promoted to the division above. The two lowest-placed players in each division shall normally be relegated to the division below.



# Commemorating the Bicentenary of the Edinburgh -London Correspondence Chess Match

A correspondence chess game between players has a long history. The earliest is thought to be played between the Emperor Nicephorus (760-811) and the Caliph of Baghdad, Harun al-Rachid (763-809) in the 9th century. In the 1600s, Venetian and Croatian merchants played correspondence chess. The earliest known postal game was between a Dutch army officer named Freidrich Wilhelm von Mauvillon (1774-1851) stationed at Breda, Netherlands, and one of his friends stationed at The Hague (Den Haag), Netherlands in 1804.

However the first well known correspondence chess challenge was the Edinburgh - London chess club match, from April 24, 1824 to July 31, 1828 which the former - though underdog -won by 2-1 (draws not counting). The match saw the first recorded use of the Scotch Game (1.e4 e5 2.Nf3 Nf6 3.d4) which strangely enough was used by the London players.

The letters (with moves) were carried a distance of nearly 400 miles by horse driven carts and received good publicity; several newspapers published the moves. It was not without controversy; London attempted to retract a move in one game, even appealing to the Postmaster (unsuccessfully)-to have their letter returned. As per the rules of the match, the losers had to provide the winners with a silver trophy to the value of £25. (Now valued at over £3000 but priceless). Edinburgh named it the Scots Gambit Cup, and it has a prominent place today in their trophy cabinet.

The author wishes to celebrate and commemorate the bicentenary of the match with interesting knight tours on 10x20 (= 200) and 2x10x10 (= 200) board. Figure 1 is a magic tour of knight on 10x20 board. Here the sum of all the rows is 2010 and that of columns is 1005. Readers are urged to look for closed magic tour.

Figure 2 is a monogram tour on 2x10x10 board with square numbers  $1^2$ ,  $2^2$ ,  $3^2$ , ...  $14^2$ , namely, 1, 4, 9, ... 196 delineating letters 'E' and 'L', the first letters in Edinburgh and London respectively. Figure 3 has the square numbers delineating numbers '2' and '0', the numerals in 200.

The Edinburgh Chess Club reenacted the match to celebrate its bicentenary and fielded 24 players across 42 boards. The London team, eyeing revenge, mustered a full 42 players, almost twice the number. It is often said, "History repeats itself". It did. The smaller games load of the London players made no difference and the Edinburgh team won by 56-28 with 38 games ending in draws. Full details are in SCCA magazines 164 and 165.





'Richard Beecham is one of Scotland's top Correspondence Chess players. Recently he won a classic game against one of England's top Correspondence Chess players - SIM Ian Pheby. We reproduce the game here together with Richard's notes that he has kindly provided to us. It is a King's Indian with Richard having the White pieces. Enjoy.

My opponent, Ian Pheby, is a legend in his own lifetime and a thoroughly nice chap. Ian could have been a GM if he hadn't played so many games and events in recent seasons. For example, he played in 8 events in 2023, 15 in 2022 and 24 in 2021. He has even had a chess tournament named after him!

The English Correspondence Chess Federation has also honoured him for his long and dedicated service. Ian has held several posts with the ICCF having started in 2006 as a tournament director and then later as a tournament organiser. Ian became an International Arbiter in 2009.

In 2010, he was involved in the administration of special leave while in 2011 he became Direct Entry Commisioner for a six year period.

He is also a member of the **Tournament Directors Committee** having taken on that role during 2014.

Ian has also been tournament organiser of the Veterans World Cups 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12. He also received the Bertl von Massow Silver Medal in 2015 and the Gold Medal in 2021 for his services to the ICCF. In England with the EFCC,

Ian has also held a variety of posts since 2003 including Games Archivist, International Secreary, Treasurer since 2020 and President

since 2017. Ian also regularly finds time to play correspondence chess at a high level and was awarded his SIM title in 2004. At that time his rating was 2602 having reached a maximum of 2621.

Our game here was played in the Diamond/Ruby English Federation for Correspondence Chess event to celebrate the Diamond Anniversary of the EFCC which was formed on December 1st, 1962.

After 10..c5 11.Ne1 Ne8 12 Nd3 f5 13.ef5 gf5 14.f4 Nef6 15 fe5 Ne5 16 Ne5 de5 17.Bg5 Qe8 18 Nb5 the position is equal. Another possibility is 10.. Ng4 which turned out badly for Black from the game between Gabriel Sagissian (2677) and Jaime Santos Latoso (2549) cf. 10...Ng4 11.Bg5 f6 12.Bd2 c5 13 Nb5 Nb8 14 b4 Na6 15.Ne1 cb4 16.f3 Nh6 17.Nd3 f5 18.c5 de5 19.de6 and White is winning.
